


The crunch for beds during last year's Delta surge led to the Adult ICU at UPMC Magee-Womens Hospital transitioning to a COVID-19 unit. Raghavan Murugan, MD, MS (CCM '06), critical care chief at UPMC Magee, faced a wave of COVID-19 patients who were younger, unvaccinated and often pregnant. The death of a 22-year-old man from respiratory failure left an immense emotional toll on his team. He co-created the HOPE Initiative for team members to share their emotions and connect with others feeling the same way—it helped a lot.



Fellow Profile: Liz Pace, MD

Second-year pediatric cardiac critical care fellow and cochief CICU fellow

Has your fellowship changed your career plans? Yes! Originally, my plan was to be a PICU attending with pediatric cardiac skills. I love seeing pathophysiology play out in front of my eyes in these incredibly complex cardiac patients. Learning from consummate teachers and brilliant practitioners helped me find my calling:



pediatric cardiac critical care. It's a high-risk, high-reward field and I love it every day.

How do you use data in your triathlon training? I'm very data-driven. My triathlon coach and I use physiologic data to see how my body handles the run, bike and swim training; sleep deprivation; and to track recovery. Data lets me train efficiently. I'll be in Hawaii in June for my first half Ironman and Wisconsin in September for my first full Ironman. Understanding data is also a big part of my master's in clinical research. Ultimately, I want to use data to build new clinical trials.
